Principal's Report

NAPLAN results

The aggregated NAPLAN data has been released to schools. The individual results will be sent to parents/carers as soon as they arrive in the school. There have been changes to the proficiency levels for NAPLAN this year and there is an article elsewhere in the newsletter explaining the changes. The results for Canterbury Girls' Secondary College are outstanding and we are the highest performing Government secondary school in Boroondara. Thank you to teachers, parents, carers and students for all their work. The results show that for each area, the percentage of students in the top two bands are: Year 7 Reading 92%, Year 7 Writing 88%, Spelling 87%, Year 7 Numeracy 87%, Grammar and Punctuation 84%, Year 9 Reading 88%, Year 9 Writing 90%, Year 9 Spelling 84%, Year 9 Numeracy 88%, and Year 9 Grammar and Punctuation 80%.

Upcoming events

Welcome back to Term 3. There are a number of events this term for students and families.

There are two major Music events this term. The first one is the Canterbury Cabaret to be held on Friday 21 July in McMillan Hall. Last year's Cabaret was a great event and I am sure it will be just as good this year. The annual Music Concert at the Besen Centre will be held on Thursday 17 August. Further details about how to purchase tickets will be communicated closer to the date.

This term we also welcome visitors from Takakura High School in Japan. The ten students will be staying with CGSC families and the two teachers will be hosted by staff.

The House Captains have begun preparation for Dance Drama. For parents and carers who are new to the school, each House has to prepare a 20 minute production involving acting and dancing in response to a prompt. The House Captains have been writing the script and have called for students who are interested in participating. There will be two evening performances for families and friends on Wednesday 13 and Thursday 14 September culminating in adjudication day on the last day of Term 3. I encourage all students to be involved.

Student activities

Over the past few weeks, we have received letters of thanks from a number of organisations which student groups have supported with financial donations generated by the different fund-raising activities run by the student leaders and student activities such as the Business Fairs. The students at Canterbury do a lot of work across the year to support various charities. We have received letters of appreciation from Opportunity International Australia, World Vision, the Make a Wish Foundation and the RSPCA.

Upcoming changes to NAPLAN reporting

Ahead of NAPLAN results for students being released from Monday 17 July 2023, I would like to inform you of some changes to this year's reporting. These are changes being introduced nationally by the Australian Curriculum Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA). NAPLAN will continue to measure student achievement in numeracy, reading, writing, spelling, and grammar and punctuation but the results will now be presented in 4 proficiency levels. These are: exceeding, strong, developing and needs additional support. This change will give schools, parents and guardians clearer information that details student achievement against new proficiency levels. Students' NAPLAN reports will continue to show how they are tracking against their peers and provide an indication of their skill levels against national averages and where we would expect them to be in order to get the most out of schooling. This provides valuable information to teachers about how we can continue to support your child. Each set of NAPLAN results is an important milestone but it's also important that students know that one result does not define them - these results are about making sure every student gets the support they need so they can continue to get the best from their learning. When we provide you with your results, you will also receive information about what the new proficiency levels mean.

Events on Compass

It is very important that parents/carers check Compass regularly and approve and pay for any excursions on Compass by the due date. If authorisation and payment does not occur on the due date the student will be unable to attend the excursion. A reminder that parents/carers should not share their log-in details, including passwords with their child. Students have separate log-in details to parents/carers and they are unable to perform many of the functions that parents/carers have access to. To change your password please go to your home page and on the top right-hand side under "tools", click "change my password".

News from the French Department

14 July - Bastille Day!

Bastille Day, in French 'La Fête Nationale', is a national holiday in France that marks the storming of the Bastille, a key moment in the French Revolution. Since last Friday was Bastille Day, here is some information about the history of the day and how it is celebrated.

How was the date chosen?

The date marks the anniversary of the Storming of the Bastille in 1789, during the French Revolution. The Bastille was a prison that housed people who were jailed by direct order of the King, in such a way that did not allow them to appeal (defend themselves against) the sentence, a prime example of the absolute power of the monarchy that the Revolution fought against. At the time of storming, the prison only held seven people, but it was a symbol of oppression.

How is 'La Fête Nationale' celebrated in France?

On 14 July each year, in Paris a Bastille military parade is held in the morning, starting at the Arc de Triomphe and moving along the Champs-Élysées until it finishes at the Place de la Concorde. Many other French cities and towns hold parades, including overseas territories. Other festivities include fireworks and parties, and since it's a public holiday, many people also like to relax, opting for picnics or going out for dinner where many restaurants offer special 'Fête Nationale' menus.



Many other countries celebrate the day, including Francophone (French speaking) countries. You can also find celebrations in Melbourne each year at the Bastille Day French Festival. On 8-9 July, there were many French-themed activities to participate in such as cooking masterclasses, and the Queen Victoria market hosted a French winter market. Last weekend, there was a screening of a beloved French film 'Amélie' at Cinema Nova in Carlton, in addition to a French-themed Bastille Day Soirée featuring 90s 'discothèque' music.

BOOK CHAT



String Workshop with Karen Kyriakou – 19 July

Yesterday our intermediate and senior string students were treated to an incursion by the dynamic Karen Kyriakou. Karen has worked exclusively as a musician and a music educator, teaching in schools, the community and own home teaching studio. Karen has been involved in tutoring at numerous music camps, String festivals, and frequently delivers workshops to students specializing in improvisation and composition. She is both a performer and a 'Composer In The Classroom' with the Musica Viva In Schools program, and also works as a freelance Composer in Residence with community groups as well as school-based ensembles. Karen is an active committee member of the Austa (Australian Strings Association) in her state of Victoria and presents at music education conferences. She also freelances with both Community and Education projects with the Melbourne Symphony Orchestra.





Karen's recent musical journeys have taken her to working with deaf children and introducing them to the world of playing and making music. A recent deaf/music project involved working with the Melbourne Symphony Orchestra and leading an Auslan (Australian Sign Language) choir to Beethoven's 9th Symphony. Aside from composing educational works for school string ensembles, Karen also writes works for theatre, and is the composer and arranger for her world-music band Kazband, her music receiving positive media attention and regular airplay on radio throughout Australia.





In the workshop, Karen worked with the students to teach them a Hungarian folk tune. She taught the piece aurally and focused on many music elements, sharing the melody, harmony, bassline between all sections. Karen's approach for the workshop was to teach the students without music notation, which enabled the students to open their ears even more and listen to their sound and that of

EDITORIAL

The Girls' School, Mangarra Road, East Camberwell, was opened in February, 1928, under the able direction of the first Head Mistress, Miss Flynn. She retired from the position of Head Mistress at the end of 1931, after having built up a School worthy to take its place among the best of the girls' schools in the metropolitan area. It was with deep regret that the pupils and staff bade farewell to Miss Flynn, for she had spared no effort in making a success of the School, and it was with great pleasure they welcomed her when she paid a visit to the School on her return from a trip abroad.

The School continues to carry on the tradition of fine work and good fellowship within its walls. A school of this kind, with its dual purpose, is of great value to the community. Here we have the girls, in the adolescent stage, wholly under the supervision of women teachers. Some of the girls are being trained in Domestic Arts. which will be of great service to them in their own homes, or when they go out to take their place in the world of industry. They learn the science of homecraft, and so it does not seem a drudgery. The girls are happy at the practical work, as evidenced when we have a dress parade of the frocks made under the direction of the teacher, or when we see a group icing Christmas cakes in the kitchen. Hand and eye are working in conjunction, and there is pride in the creative activity which produces something worthwhile. These are the future women of Australia, and this training will fit them for their life-work. They are being trained to be self-reliant, and not afraid to grapple with the problems that arise in every home. They can estimate the cost of materials needed in the kitchen, the laundry, and the housewilery department of a home, as well as the cost and reliability of materials used in dressmaking, millinery, etc.

On the other hand, we have our large sub-intermediate and intermediate ate classes, where the girls have already had their practical training in home management.

In 1931, twenty girls gained the Intermediate Certificate, and several are pending in one or two subjects. This year we are looking forward to an even greater number completing the examination.

It was the desire of many parents that there should be a class for Leaving Certificate in the School, but, owing to the financial stringency, their request could not be complied with. Consequently, our girls passed on to the University High School, or to the Melbourne Girls' School.

Fifty-nine girls gained the Merit Certificate, and 100 girls gained the Domestic Arts Certificate.

The School is indeed fortunate in having a very loyal and efficient staff, able and reliable prefects, and an interested and progressive Advisory Council and Mothers' Club. The parents of the girls have always given generous assistance in any effort that has been organised for the benefit of the School, showing that they recognise and appreciate the training and care that their girls receive while they are pupils of the School.


