### Year 12 Legal Studies Excursion to Supreme Court of Victoria

During a school excursion, our class had the incredible opportunity to visit the Victorian Supreme Court's library. Our knowledgeable guides led us through the library, sharing fascinating insights about the court's rich history. We observed the captivating portrait of Justice Marilyn Warren, the first female Chief Justice in Australia, symbolising the progress and barriers overcome within the court system. We were fascinated by the sight of ancient legal texts, case law reports and archival materials that traced the evolution of the Victorian legal system over the years. The visit to the Victorian Supreme Court's library not only deepened our understanding of the law but also inspired us to appreciate the importance of legal research, the pursuit of justice, and the valuable role that such a library plays in supporting emerging legal professionals.

On Monday 17 July, one of the Year 12 VCE Legal Studies classes had the pleasure of attending a tour of the Supreme Court of Victoria. We were lucky enough to be spoken to by the honorable Justice Michelle Quigley. Justice Quigley has previously worked as a barrister, as a member of the Queen's Council and subsequently was appointed the President of VCAT. She now works as a Supreme Court judge in the common law division. With her positive and eloquent manner, she educated us with reference to her experience as a high-ranking legal professional. Firstly, she walked us through her establishment in the legal field, all the way to the moral and ethical implications of cases she currently hears. She also outlined the importance of setting aside personal bias and prejudice, the significance of equality before the law and the gravity of judicial decision making. Justice Quigley is an inspirational example of a female in the legal sphere, and everyone commented on her encouragement and sagacity.
